"The Third Curriculum"

Student Activities have been called by many names over the years, and while the definition of "curriculum" historically has caused much debate, the appropriate title recognizing student activities lacks universal acceptance. The term "extracurricular activities," gives the impression that they are outside the curriculum. Today in education, student activities are accepted as a major part of the total school program.

The "Third Curriculum," seems to be the best title, as it implies two additional curricula. The first is the course work required to earn a high school diploma. The second curriculum allows for student choice, exploration, and specialization that comprise the electives our students study to prepare for post-secondary schooling or work. The third curriculum, student activities, represents a wide variety of school-sponsored teams, clubs and organizations. Research reveals that it is in these activities students learn how to apply the skills learned in the first two curriculums.

The lessons learned from the third curriculum include critical lessons in leadership, fellowship, character, communications, teamwork, decision-making, self-worth, and individual potential.

Success in college can be accurately predicted from quality of individual achievement in activities. Grades in high school, class rank, and ACT or SAT scores and involvement in co-curricular activities are, combined, the best indicator of future success. Notably, studies of school dropouts have consistently shown that students who leave school prior to graduation are students who are unlikely to participate in student activities.

In short, co-curricular activities play an integral role on campus -- they improve school climate, they teach valuable lessons in leadership, and they serve as a creative outlet that enhances the overall educational experiences for students.
